At Summer School in Neuroscience, we encourage you to join this movement and create a more animated oral presentation of your project. You can use an animated software program such as Prezi or interactive programs as Socrative for the presentation, but you are also welcome to use your creativity and make use of an alternate presentations form.

Practicalities

The Summer School is conducted as a residential two-day course at Huset, and a room will be booked for all participants unless we are informed otherwise.

The course language is primarily English.

The abstract must be in English and written in a way so that researchers from other fields are able to understand the content.

The abstract should be of maximum 1 A4 page with the following style: Title: 14 pt., Text font: 12 pt., Times new roman.

Abstracts should be structured as follows: 1. Title, 2. Authors names, including work place and email address, 3. Purpose and background, 4. Designs and methods, 5. Preliminary results, 6. Possible conclusions, and 7. Perspective on which specific challenges you have encountered in your research project.

You should also write how far along you are in the Ph.D, programme: upcoming, in the preparation stage, well under way with your project.

At the Summer School the presentations will reviewed by peers and senior researchers.
