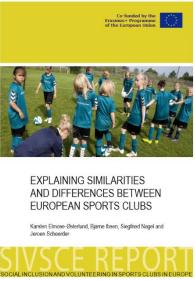


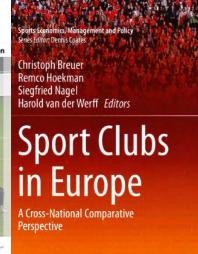

Historical Background



UNIVERSITÄT BERN

Sports clubs played a crucial role for the introduction of modern sport to Switzerland in the 19th century

- (1) German Turnen and shooting clubs: health and education, social goals, military defense
- (2) English Sports: sport competitions, leisure time activity, conviviality

Important reasons for being a major force in Swiss sport:

- Club friendly environment (important role of voluntary sector)
- Clubs as a partial substitute for public initiatives (principle of subsidiarity)

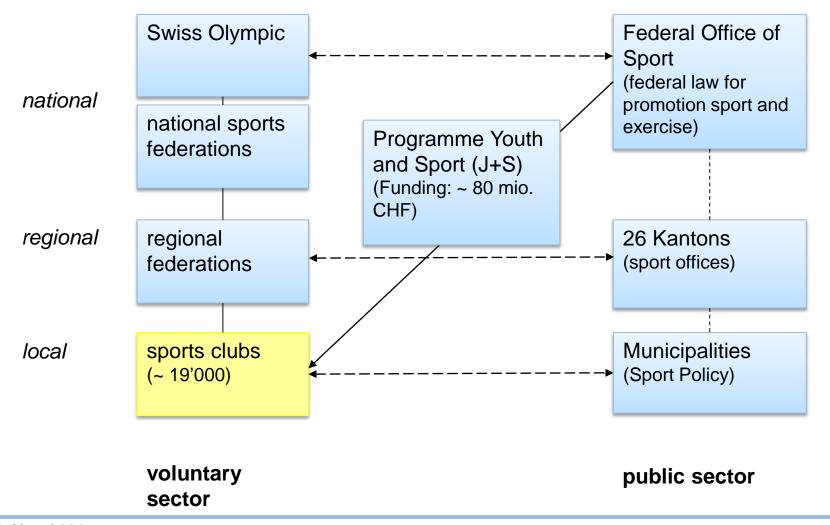

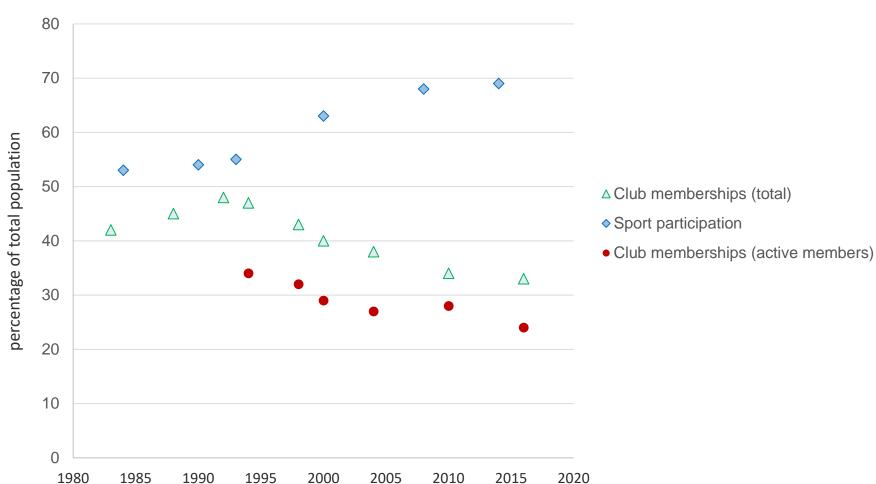

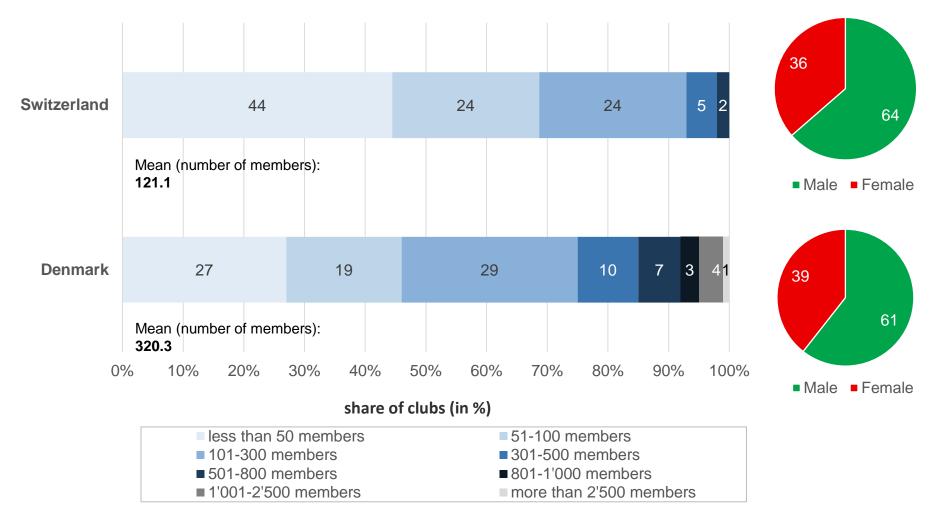

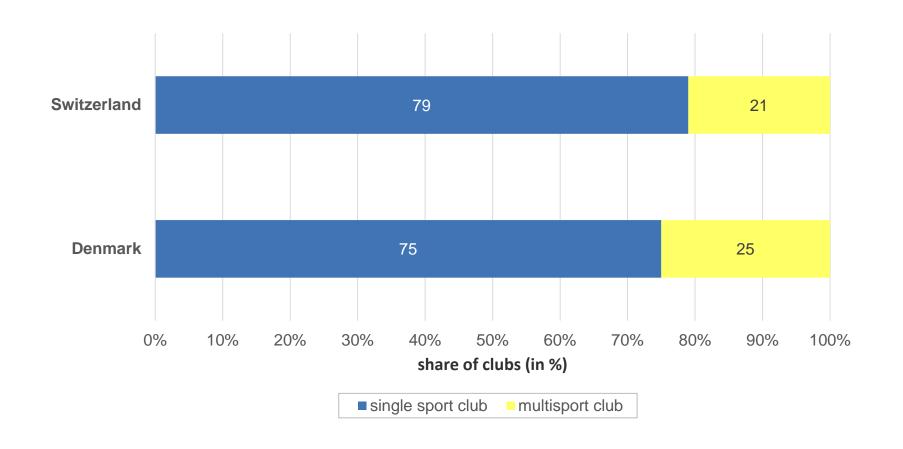

Type of sport club (single vs. multisport club)

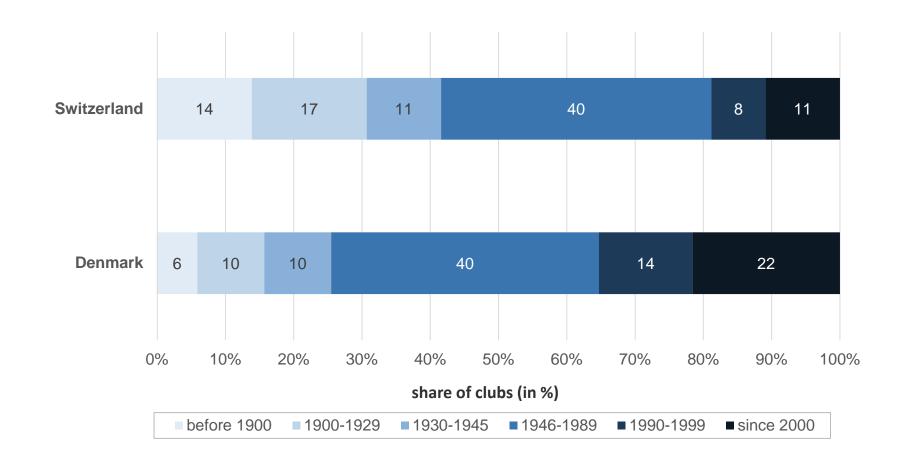

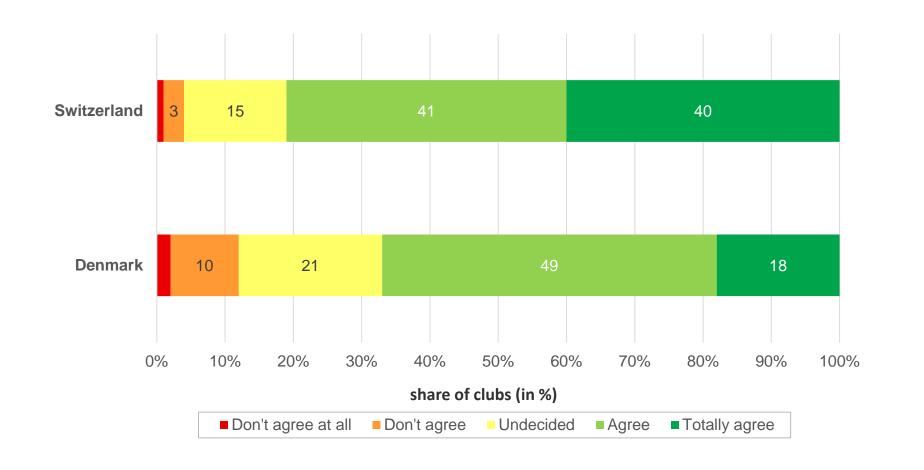

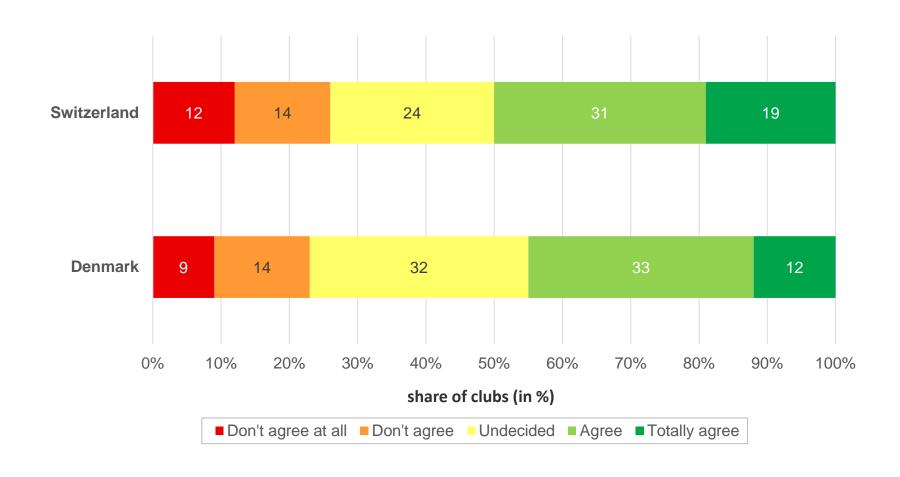

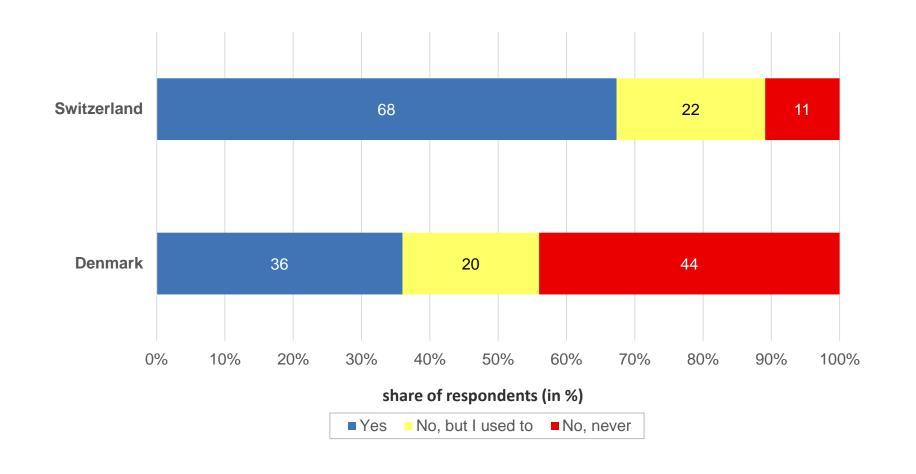




Share of respondents active in competitive sports



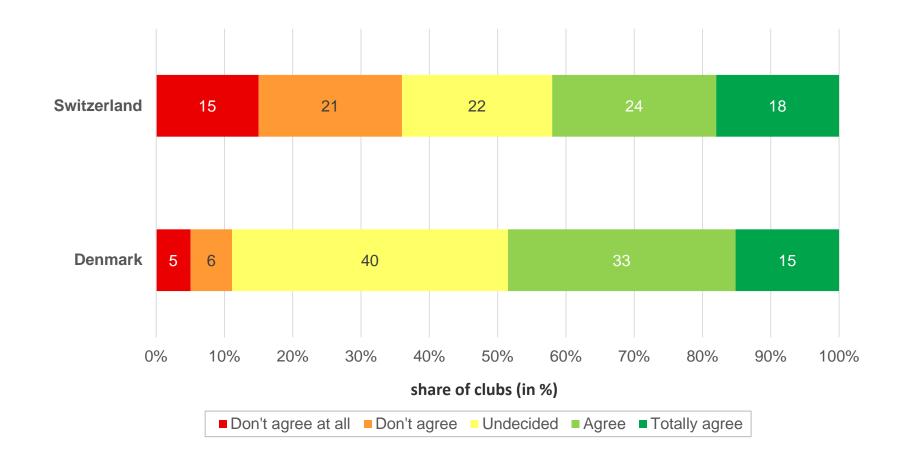

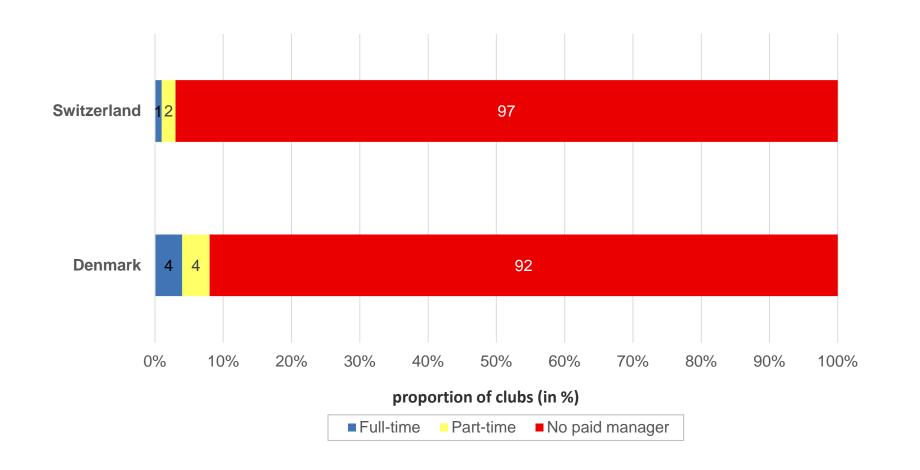

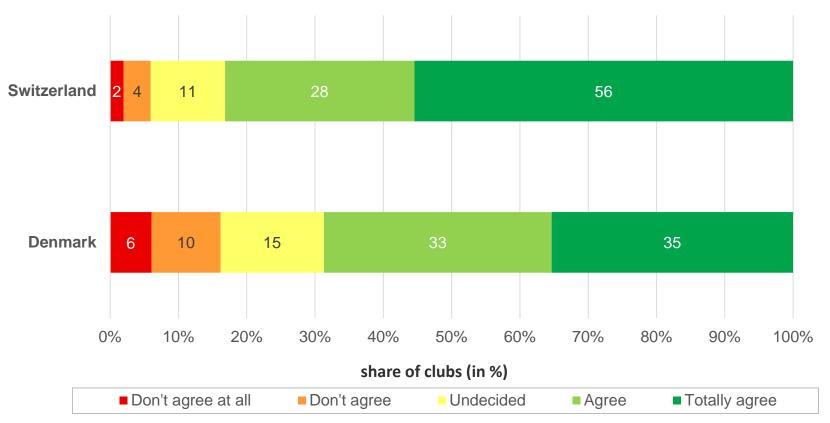


Crucial role of volunteering in club management

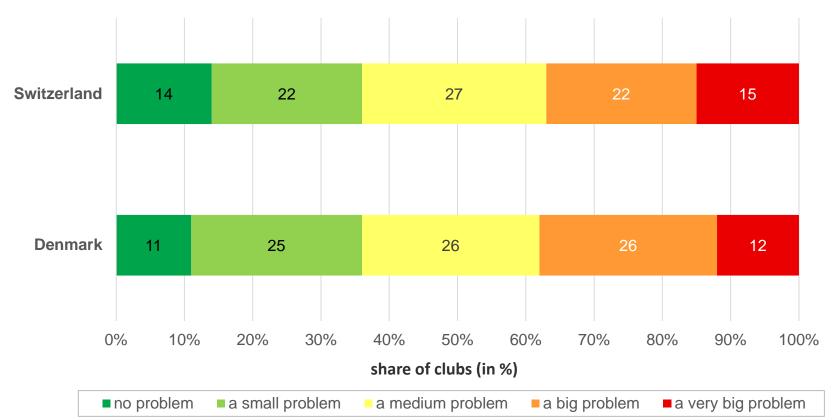

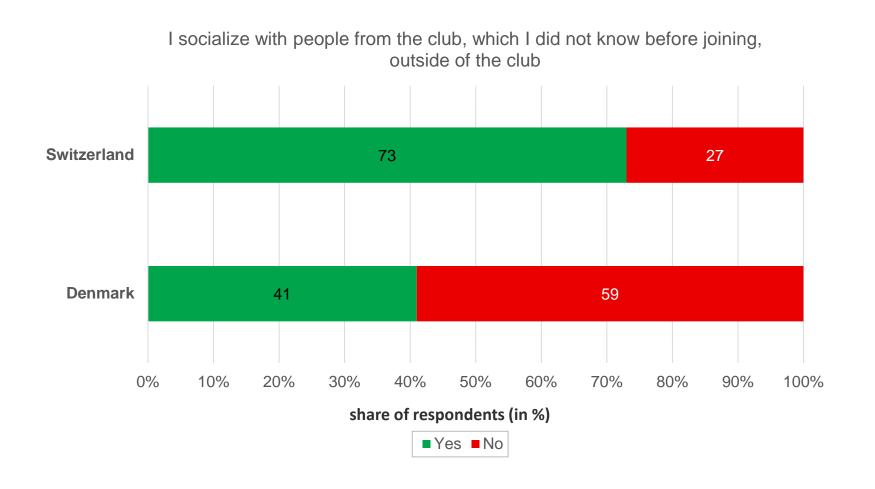

UNIVERSITÄT BERN

Different club goals: DEN: health enhancing physical activity

SUI: sporting success and conviviality

probable reason: different gymnastics movements

- Social integration more important in Swiss sport clubs
- Differences in democratic dimension (SUI: members more integrated in decision making)
- SUI: Idea of volunteering in leadership more crucial
