MSCA European Fellowships in brief

European Fellowships support the mobility of researchers and provide opportunities to work on ambitious research in Europe. The researcher and host must be a strong match, demonstrating the potential for scientific excellence and the acquisition of new skills and knowledge on both sides.

A Career Development Plan is established jointly by the hosting supervisors and the researcher. In addition to the research

objectives, this plan comprises the researcher's training and career needs, including the development of transferable skills, plan for publications, and potential participation in conferences.



Who? Researchers with a PhD degree or 4 years' experience.

What? 100% funding for 1-2 years.

Where? In or to Europe.

When? Deadline in September; application collaboration with host from April or before.

Establish yourself as a leading expert in your field

Fellowship facts

- Research stay in an EU Member State or associated country
- Full funding for fellowships of 12-24 months
- Can help to restart research careers after a break
- Can reintegrate researchers returning to Europe
- All nationalities can apply
- All areas of research are supported
- Have a PhD degree or at least four years' research experience by the call deadline
- Mobility across sectors is encouraged

Extensive support for applicants

The University of Southern Denmark (SDU) Research Support team will assist you at every step of your Marie Skłodowska-Curie European Fellowship application.

First of all, you need to establish contact with an SDU host environment. After that, please contact SDU Research Support. We will, in close cooperation with the scientific host and contracted EU consultants, help you in writing a pitch-perfect application that benefits from expert counseling and co-development of both scientific and non-scientific parts. When a grant is awarded, our International Staff Office will help you in all aspects of taking up residence and working in Denmark, including with practical, social, cultural and legal matters.

FIRST STEPS in initiating an application...

1. Reach out to a potential hosting environment
2. Get in touch with SDU Research Support
3. Read the call as well as any best practice applications and guidelines forwarded by SDU Research Support
4. Sign-up in for the MSCA Masterclass in May

The good application

- Start early – make time for reviews and revisions
- Write a pitch for the project and training concept
- Get as much feedback on this as possible
- Develop a very good research project!
- Participate in SDU's MSCA Masterclass in May
- Show there is a good match between fellow and host
- Keep in mind that training is a central part of the grant and that secondments are looked favorably upon
- Get impartial views on your proposal – from Research Support, the host, colleagues and collaborators





Why SDU?

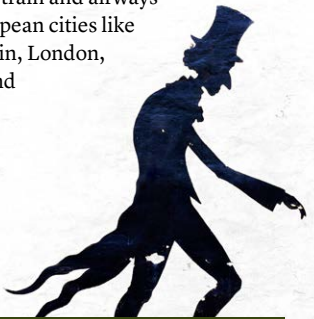
The University of Southern Denmark is a young and dynamic university with high standards in education, internationally competitive research and an entrepreneurial approach.

What to do now?

Once you have made a good match with an SDU host environment, you should...

- Write your project ideas down on a one-pager and forward to your host
- Get in touch with SDU Research Support, who will happily answer all your questions, lay down an application road map and provide extensive support at every step
- Research Support will put you in contact with previous SDU-based grantees and forward you examples of successful applications
- Participate in the two-day MSCA Masterclass in May in Odense (which is led by field-leading EU application consultants)
- Read the call documents carefully
- Write the proposal in close collaboration with the SDU supervisor and with full support from Research Support
- Try and finish a full first draft at least 2 months before the application deadline in September to allow ample time for reviews and revisions
- Submit the proposal in a timely way
