Danish Centre for Welfare Studies (DaWS) is an interdisciplinary research centre contributing to national and international academic and public debates on welfare-related issues. Established in 2005, DaWS is an internationally highly recognized, dynamic, thriving research unit. The Centre's research areas include the normative foundation of the welfare state and its development in a comparative and historical perspective, responses of the welfare state to external challenges and the impact of the welfare state on individuals. Through our research, we aim to address and contribute to solving major societal challenges.

DaWS emphasizes high-quality research, and we will continue to:

- Produce research at the highest level within the field of welfare research
- Contribute to the development of the field of welfare studies
- Be nationally and internationally recognized for top-class scholarship
- Offer a significant contribution to interdisciplinary research at SDU and internationally

With respect to teaching, we aim to offer high-quality teaching and training for students across different programmes at SDU. High-quality teaching is research-based teaching that gives students strong academic competencies and stimulates their curiosity and critical sense.

The university is not a castle. We believe our research should have impact also beyond the halls of academia. Researchers at DaWS work to broadly disseminate research findings and to address, cooperate, and contribute to solving major societal challenges.

Finally, we believe in the importance of a good research work environment that offers an intellectually stimulating and socially well-functioning workplace. A good work environment is characterized by pluralism, high academic standards, curiosity and social interaction.

For the next four years (2022-2026), we will continue our work to maintain and realize the abovementioned goals. More specifically, we will focus on the following sub-goals:
