INVESTIGATING AND OPTIMIZING OUTCOMES FOR FAMILY CAREGIVERS FOLLOWING OUT-OF-HOSPITAL CARDIAC ARREST

The project: **Investigating and optimizing outcomes for family caregivers following out-of-hospital cardiac arrest, OHCA** is conducted by ph.d. student Ditte Bekker-Jensen, Department of Cardiology, Odense University Hospital. Ditte has a background as a nurse in intensive care and a Master in Nursing Science.

With her clinical background she has experience with cardiac arrest survivors and their families – an experience highly relevant for the project.

In Denmark, survival rates following out of hospital cardiac arrest (OHCA) are improving, but still, it is well-known how resuming everyday life following discharge can be challenged. OHCA survivors struggle with cognitive deficits and difficulties returning to activities of daily living. Despite affecting the life of the survivor, recent studies have highlighted how many family caregivers experience affected mental health, including symptoms of post-traumatic stress, anxiety and impaired quality of life (QOL). Nevertheless, these outcomes are sparsely investigated among family caregivers of OHCA survivors, including paired outcomes of the survivor and their closest relative. This will be investigated in the following three studies:

In the first study, we will investigate the psychometric properties of the Danish version of the Hospital Anxiety and Depression Scale (HADS) in relatives of OHCA survivors. Currently, HADS is well-validated among several cardiac populations and has previously been used to compare a patient population with their relatives. However, whether this instrument is appropriate among relatives of OHCA-survivors has not yet been investigated. In study two, we will i) describe and compare QoL and mental health among OHCA survivors and their closest relatives, and ii) investigate clinical, demographic and cognitive outcomes of the survivor and the potential association with poor QoL and mental health among their closest relatives. Finally, in study three, we will assess the feasibility of a complex intervention for a future randomized controlled trial (RCT). The intervention will be aimed at the dedicated needs of the family after cardiac arrest.

The project is financed by the University of Southern Denmark, Odense University Hospital, and the Novo Nordisk Foundation.

Cristina Alfaro Díaz's Collaborative Insights: Enhancing International Perspectives in Family- Centered Research



In 2023, we had the privilege of hosting Cristina Alfaro Díaz, an assistant professor at the School of Nursing, Universidad de Navarra, Spain, at FaCe. Cristina's visit brought an invaluable international perspective, enhancing our ongoing research endeavors.

As an active member of the research group "Innovation for Family and Community Health Promotion" at the University of Navarra and the Navarra Institute for Health Research (IdiSNA), Cristina has dedicated herself to translating family nursing knowledge into clinical practice in Spain. Her expertise lies in designing, adapting, and psychometrically validating questionnaires, including the cross-cultural adaptation and psychometric validation of several instruments for the Spanish version.

During her stay, Cristina engaged in insightful discussions and meetings with various experts from the FaCe group. Her focus primarily revolved around understanding how therapeutic conversations are offered to families in clinical practice and the training nurses receive for such care. Moreover, these discussions with different experts allow her to know the research initiatives taking place at FaCe, facilitating the exchange of ideas and the establishment of collaborative synergies for future research projects and studies.

We value Cristina's contribution to our center and appreciate the knowledge exchange and collaborative spirit she brought during her tenure at FaCe.

Driving insights in young adult Sibling-Centric Cancer Care Research

Developing a Comprehensive Resource on Family Outcomes in Healthcare

This year Kirsti joined us for a project-oriented internship as part of her final year of the Master in Clinical Nursing at the University of Southern Denmark. Over the course of the eight-week internship, she took the first steps in conducting a scoping review on existing outcome measures to determine family outcomes. The purpose with the review is to assemble a comprehensive table that encompasses questionnaire types, settings, patient groups and translations. This table is intended to serve as a “toolbox” for researchers, providing a roadmap for those seeking to delve into family outcomes in healthcare settings.



·Ten major types of family outcomes were identified and defined from the preliminary search, and these served as a guide in the database searches.
