What to do?

- Placement arrangements?
- Contact with the perpetrator?
- Custody



Visitation rights with the perpetrator parent in prison

Very little empirical data

No evidence based guidelines



Visitation rights: what did we do?

2003 — 60 casefiles — 2012

Visiting vs. non-visiting





Visitation rights: what did we find?


48% visited







Visitation rights: what did we find?





Visitation rights: perpetrator mothers

All children visited

Placement: more often neutral caregivers

All cases a history of domestic violence



Visitation rights: what does it tell us?

Almost half visited the perpetrator parent in prison

Whishes of the child mostly followed (CCAIPH)

Not in line with forcing visits, but.....



Visitation rights: what does it tell us?

Child should be able to develop their own view

Sometimes pressure on the child

Future research:

How do caregivers influence the child's own wish regarding visiting?



Visitation rights: what does it tell us?

Other factors related to (not) visiting?

Perpetrator mother: violence assessed differently?

Can this study help child protection services and youth agencies ?



Importance each child can develop their own view and opinion
